Effort Scores

Attendance matters

90% sounds pretty high - right??

A 90% attendance rate means that your child has missed 4 whole weeks of educational tuition in a year.

We have 25 hours of lessons per week.

Punctuality matters - lates to lessons??

5 minutes late each day = 16 hours / year = 3 school days lost 10 minutes late each day = 32 hours / year = 6 school days lost


Ebbinghaus' Forgetting Curve






How to use a knowledge organiser

- Step 5: With a different colour pen, write down any information you missed so you can visibly see any gaps in your knowledge





Creating the right environment at home for independent learning

Where possible find a room that is away from the rest of the family:

- ✓ Their own bedroom
- ✓ the back room
- ✓ kitchen table (after tea has been served!)
- ... somewhere quiet!

Create the right mood:

- ✓ Natural light this prevents tiredness
- ✓ A desk or table don't sit on the bed or the floor!
- A place away from 'electronic' distractions



Creating the right environment at home for independent learning

- Ensure they have all the right equipment available (pens, calculator etc.)
- Have a drink or bottle of water handy
- Quiet music can help, but not the radio and certainly NOT the TV or their phone!





YOUR SON/DAUGHTER MAY NEED TO CHANGE THEIR HABITS

Planning ahead and stacking a habit on top of another one that is already established:

"I always go on my Playstation lying on my bed when I get in from school. On Wednesday morning I am going to leave my laptop/knowledge organiser on my bed so that when I get home from school I do my Sparx maths before I go on my Playstation. I will give my Playstation controller to my parent/carer who will give it back when I show them my homework is done. I will show them my 100% score or ask them to quiz me on the things I have memorised to impress them."
